Is the Campaign for Greener Arbitrations' Model Green Procedural Order (MGPO) unavoidable?



Yes, the MGPO is unavoidable.

Benefits and potential impact

- Encourages digital communications and paperless
 operations
- Preserves forests, and cuts down energy and transportation costs
- Allows lawyers to work more efficiently and effectively by using modern technology
- Push for remote hearings and meetings
- Reduction of (i) carbon emissions associated with travel and (ii) costs for users
- Proposes alternative options when environmentally friendly options are unavailable

2 Footprint reduction measures

- Digital communications and paperless operations
- Technology as a tool to minimize paper waste
- Remote hearings and meetings encouraged; alternative solutions proposed
- Use of digital case management platforms encouraged

3 Enhanced efficiency and cost effectiveness

- Equally critical to arbitration
- Elimination of physical document exchanges, meetings and hearings speeds up the process, avoids administrative time and costs, and reduces risk of loss or damage

4 Enhanced quality and integrity of the procedure

- Embracement of the advantages of modern technology greater thoroughness and precision of the process
- Preservation of the principles of confidentiality and allowance for cyber-security measures
- Remote hearings:

 Promote diversity in panels of arbitrators and expert witnesses
 Enhance quality of deliberations
- Legitimacy of arbitration: The MGPO's drive for sustainability aligns with global socio-ethical standards, enhancing the reputation of arbitration and thus creates more confidence in the process

No, the MGPO is not unavoidable.

1 Concerns and potential drawbacks

- Arbitration = consent + party autonomy
- There are no "one size fits all" procedural orders or we will lose one of the best features of arbitration
- Raises issues of cyber security
- Cultural incompatibilities: Some styles of advocacy (e.g., U.S.) require in-person evidentiary hearings to assess the credibility of a witness

2 Implementation concerns

- Partial or total adoption?
- Use of paper can be preferred:
 - Screen fatigue
 - Facilitation of note taking
- Witness preparation is not the same remotely and does not truly prepare the witness for an in-person examination

3 Potential additional time and costs

- Use of environmentally friendly toner and ink can significantly increase costs
- Sanction? Disqualification? Award annulment?
- Greener venues may increase costs
- Other protocols referenced in the MGPO create further complications

4 Risks to quality and integrity of the procedure

- Data security and accessibility issues
- Cyber-attacks





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
